

Writing Questions in Latin.

- For some types of interrogatives all you need to do is use an place it at the beginning of the sentence.
 - ubi-when
 - ubi-where
 - cur-why
 - quo modo – how
 - quo where to
 - unde –where from
- For other interrogatives you have to ANALYZE and THINK about what FORM you need.

Take this sentence: *Dominus servorum eis pecuniam dedit.*

The master of the slaves gave them money

If you want to say *who gave the money*, you need to know that the *who* you are talking about is nominative and singular.

If you want to say *whose master gave the money*, you need to know that the *whose* you are talking about is plural and masculine.

If you want to say *whom did the master give the money*, you need to know the *whom* you are talking about is plural and dative.

WHY do you need to know all this???

Because the forms of interrogative pronouns and adjectives get declined. This means they have GENDER, NUMBER and CASE.

Another person in your group has the information about these forms.

When you are writing the questions for this assignment, be sure you **ANALYZE** what form of the interrogative you need based on how it functions in the sentence and whether it is singular or plural, masculine or feminine

You get this information by analyzing the original sentence

These are the correct ways to express the examples.

Quis pecuniam dedit (You are asking about the *dominus* – nominative singular, masc.)

Quorum dominus pecuniam dedit (You are asking about the *servorum* – genitive, pl. masc.)

Quibus dominus pecuniam dedit (You are asking about the *eis*- dative, pl. masc)
